## **SA TAFELDRUIF INDUSTRIE** **NUUSBRIEF 4: 2009/10**

### **STREKE TROTS OP PLAASWERKER VAN DIE** **JAAR WENNERS**

Die plaaswerker van die jaar kompetisie is elke jaar vir beide produsente en plaaswerkers 'n hoogtepunt. Die wenners van die 11 onderskeie areas het gedurende Oktober aan die Provinsiale kompetisie deelgeneem om die titel as Plaaswerker van die Jaar Wes-Kaap 2009 te verower.

Vanjaar se kandidate was soos gewoonlik uitmuntend en die kompetisie besonders straf. Vier van die vyf Tafeldruif streke is reeds betrokke by die kompetisie, nl. Oranjerivier, Hexrivier, Bergrivier en Olifanstrivier. Die wenners van ons streke kompeteer natuurlik teen verskeie ander boerdery bedrywighede.

Die prysuitdelings funksie was op 30 Oktober 2009 by die spoggerige Lord Charles Hotel in Somerset-Wes gehou. In die derde plek met 'n kontant prys van R5 000 was dit Rita Andreas, wenner van die Bergrivier kompetisie wat stof in die ander deelnemers se oë geskop het. In die tweede plek het Cathleen Beerwinkel, wenner van die Hexrivier kompetisie die kontant prys van R10 000 weggeraap en Marie Mallan van die Olifanstrivier het almal verbaas toe sy met die eerste prys van R20 000 wegstap. Ons is werklik vanjaar trots om te kan sê dat al drie hierdie wenners een van ons streke verteenwoordig.

Dit blyk ook dat al hoe meer dames by die kompetisie betrokke raak en soos vanjaar bewys neem hulle die voortou. Vanjaar was ook die eerste maal wat die OTPV besluit het om ook by die kompetisie betrokke te raak en dus is hulle eerste plek 'n besondere prestasie.

Gerrit van Rensburg, minister van Landbou Wes-Kaap het tydens die funksie bekend gemaak dat hy 'n Plaaswerker Forum, bestaande uit al die streeks wenners van die afgelope nege jaar se kompetisies, gaan stig. Hierdie forum sal dan die geleentheid kry om op 'n kwartaallikse basis met hom te ontmoet en belangrike kwessies te bespreek.

#### **South African Agribusiness Linkages programme (SAIBL)**

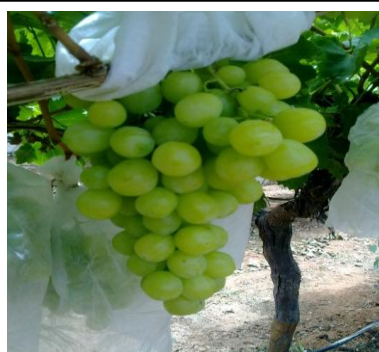

**REGIONAL FEEDBACK**

Packing in the **NTA** region commenced in Week 44/45. The earliest producers reported that their first Prime harvest would be 7-10 days later than expected whilst the balance of producers would start harvesting at the normal time. Unseasonal cold weather with some rain hit the region in Week 47. No damage or quality impacts were reported, but the cold weather caused the region to now be 5-7 days late. Acid levels are high whilst sugar build up is somewhat slow at the start of each variety's harvest window. Berry size and the general condition of the grapes are very good.

Packing in the **ORPA** region commenced in Week 45. In general the season start is normal, with only Flame Seedless being 4-6 days early in Blouputs and 4-6 days later in Upington. Acid levels are high whilst sugar build up is somewhat slow at the start of each variety's harvest window. Berry size and the general condition of the grapes are very good. Bunches are also quite heavy. There is a heavy Thompson Seedless crop hanging in the vineyards.

The **Olifants River** region will probably start at the end of Week 48 (Trawal) whilst Vredendal producers should start packing at the end of Week 49. Early indications are that quality will be very good. Downy Mildew has been detected on the young growth in vineyards but is being kept under control at the moment.

The **Berg River** region should start their packing period just after Christmas (normal start). Berry sizes seem to be somewhat small and uneven at this stage. A further worrying factor is Downy Mildew that literally appeared overnight in the vineyards throughout the region and have also infected the bunches (light to heavy infestation) of most of the early varieties (Prime, Sugraone and also Sunred Seedless).

The **Hex River** region should have a normal start to their packing season but there are also concerns regarding uneven berry sizes as well as 2 to 3 generations of grapes hanging on the vines. Downy Mildew is also prevalent but is still being kept under control.
